




Geographic Information Systems (G.I.S.)





In 2012, citizen water usage neared the City of Gillette's capacity to produce water. Due to this demand, the City of Gillette stopped watering most of its parks and facilities.

The new Madison Pipeline will not be online and delivering water until the fall of 2016.
