# ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

## J. CARTER NAPIER

Once again it is my pleasure to present the City of Gillette Annual Report to you, our citizens. If there was a time that equipped us to deal with a downturn in the local economy, 2015 was that year. We put surplus revenues to good use from a financial planning standpoint. This helped us set the stage for the challenges being faced in 2016.



As many of you were concerned about in 2015, the impact of low oil and natural gas prices and increasingly burdensome regulations has greatly affected the economic outlook for our city, county and region. There isn't a single person that hasn't been touched by what has occurred in the energy industry over the last 12 months; that includes the City as an organization. Sales Tax revenues began to decline October of 2015 and we have yet to see that decline bottom out.

One of the goals the Council set for 2015 was to "Enact balanced budgets and maintain fiscal responsibility as a hedge against market fluctuations and tax revenues in accordance with established city financial policies." We accomplished that goal, and as a result, we are positioned to better weather this downturn and look to the future.

We accomplished a great deal in 2015. We continued to upgrade our infrastructure and improve our transportation network. The Madison Pipeline project continues to progress. Thanks to grants received in 2015, the first regional water customer will come online in Spring of 2016. The new pipeline should be online and serving City water customers in early 2017. While progress in 2016 may not look like the progress we saw in 2015, Gillette's strength prevails despite the circumstances, enabling the needle to still move forward!

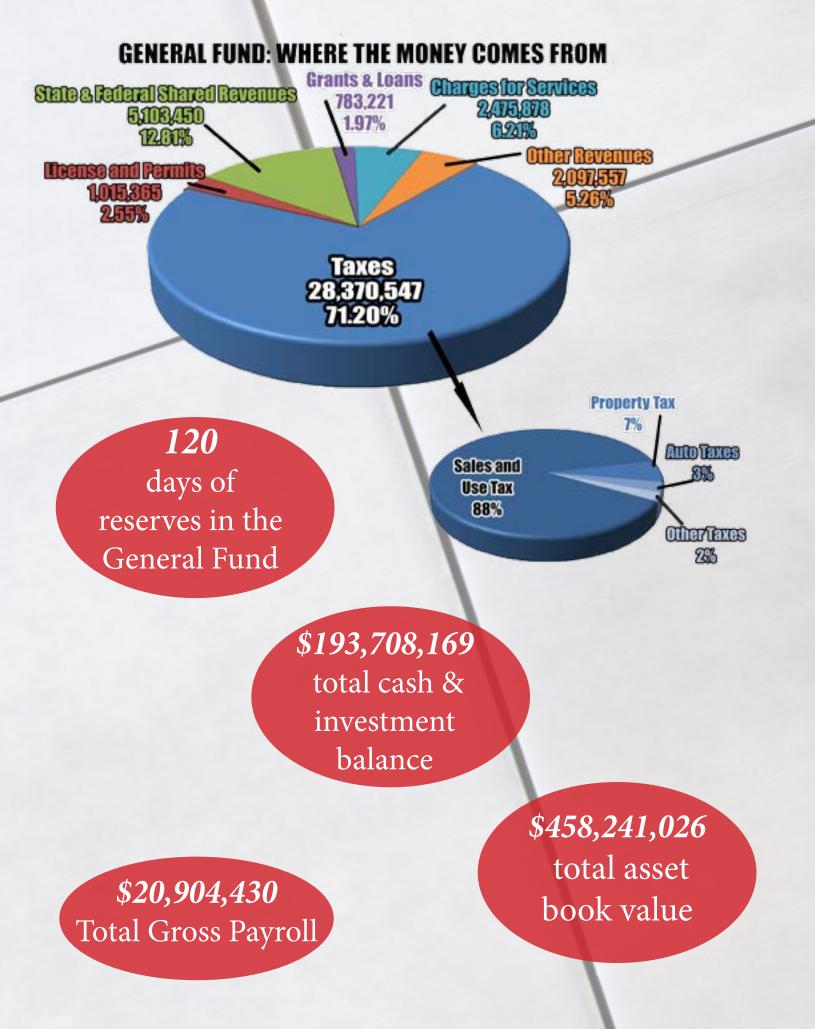
#### 2016

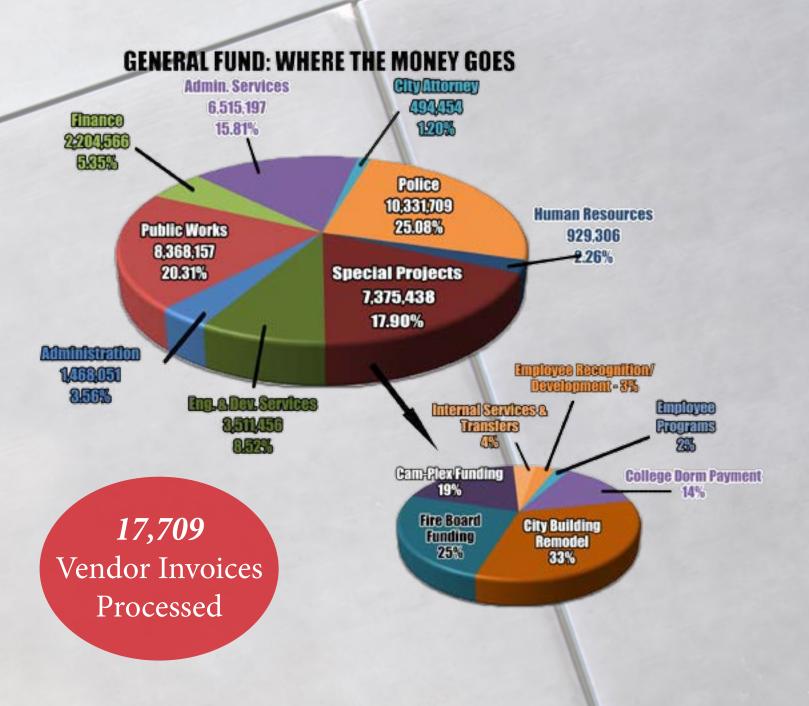
Work will be completed on the new Donkey Creek Pump Station, Pine Ridge Disinfection Facility, the Wyodak to Moorcroft pipeline contract, and the Priority One District Extensions project. Construction will also begin on the final phase of the 42" pipeline project, a new 300,000 gallon tank, a wellfield pipeline contract, and an 18" blending line. Well drilling will continue throughout the year, completing three wells in the new five well Madison wellfield. Design will begin on the next phase of the district extensions project.



The final \$12.4 million appropriation was made to fully fund the 67% grant package for the \$217.6 million Gillette Madison Pipeline Project. Additionally, the Capital Facilities Tax reached its required amount in the first quarter, putting in place \$75 million and \$20 million for the 33% local match for the Gillette Madison Pipeline Project and Regional Extensions Projects, respectively.

#### UTILITIES HIGHLIGHTS

- The Water Division proactively inspected over 12.5 miles of aging waterline to minimize unplanned mainline failures.
- Electrical Engineering completed a FERC filing which now provides the City with a \$172,000 annual savings. This Combustion Turbine (CT) II "Reactive Power Credit" toward our transmission fees, results in a lower cost for our rate payers.
- Electrical Engineering completed a broadband study and is developing procedures to allow non-franchise Internet Service Providers to enhance the community's fiber network by building private networks for faster broadband speeds.
- An additional 130 customers have been converted to COG Power in the recently annexed Southern Industrial Area with an additional 140 customers to be converted in 2016.

Criminal Arrests for adults increased 19.5% over the last year - 3,940.



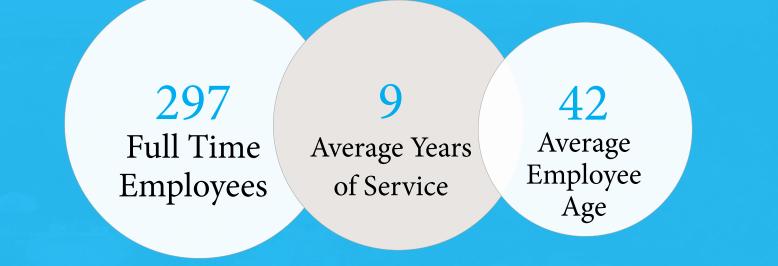
The Gillette Police Department responded to 37,005 calls in 2015, a 1.57% increase from 2014.
