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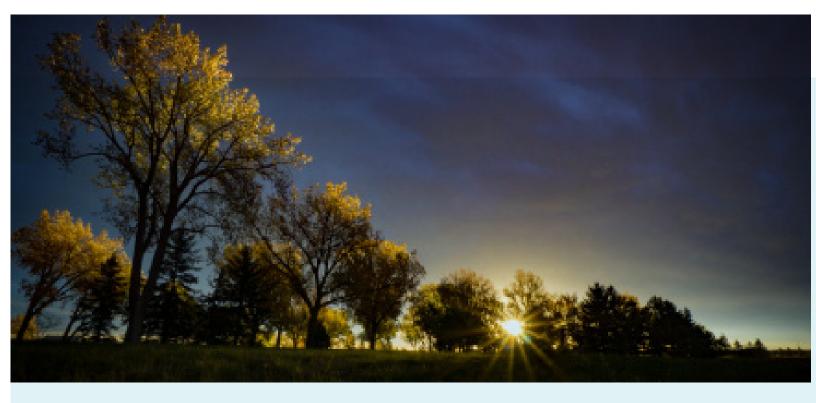

## A MESSAGE FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR



Once again it is my pleasure to present the City of Gillette Annual Report to you. 2016 was a very difficult year for many in Gillette and Wyoming. The economic downturn affected every facet of our community; the City as an organization was not immune. As a result, the City had to take a hard look at every aspect of our operations.

As a result, the City implemented a number of innovative ways to contain costs and continue to bring expenditures closer in line with the decrease in revenues we witnessed throughout the last year. I tasked City staff at all levels to think "outside the box" and they delivered. Not every idea was implemented, but every

idea was considered. It is this type of reflection that has allowed the City organization to maintain core services with minimal impact on the public.

One of the goals the Council set for 2016 was to "Maintain fiscal responsibility by enacting balanced budgets that sustain quality, core services consistent with declining revenues."
We accomplished that goal and as a result, we are better positioned to reduce the effects on City reserves as we weather the continued downturn in revenues.

Despite a difficult year financially, we accomplished a great deal in 2016. Utilizing cash on hand in the Optional 1% fund, we continued

to upgrade and maintain our infrastructure and transportation network. The Madison Pipeline project continues to progress and the first Regional Water System was added to the system in 2016 bringing muchneeded relief to those residents affected by contaminated well water. The new pipeline looks to come online in late 2017.

While 2016 was certainly a trying year, 2017 has the makings of a more predictable, if not more prosperous year.

2016 Pavement Management Schedule A

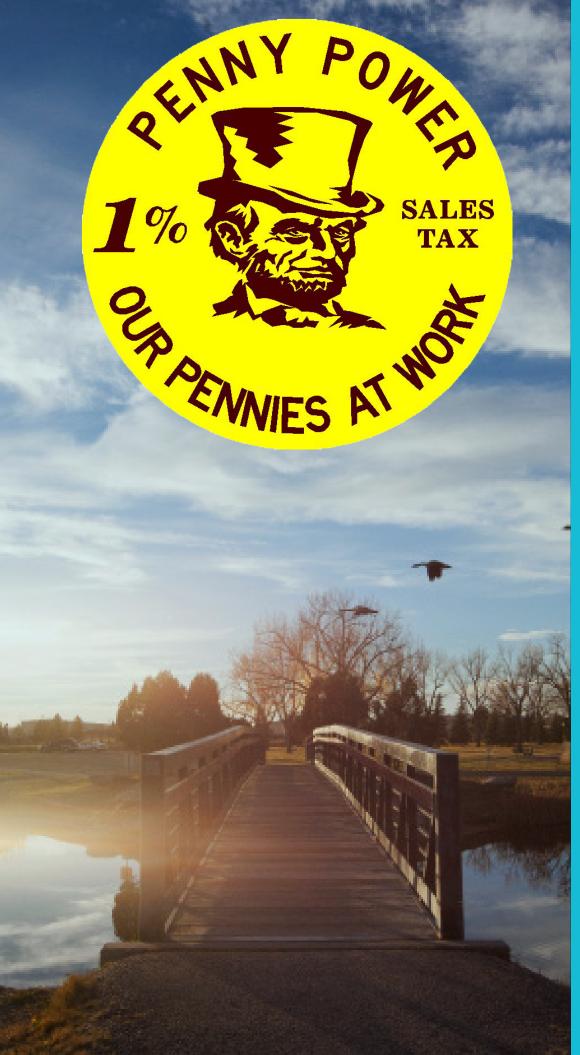


2015 Sanitary Sewer Main Replacement

In 2016, work was completed on the Pine Ridge Disinfection Facility, a new 300,000 gallon tank, the cathodic protection system, and the Priority One District Extensions Project. Work continued on the 42" transmission line, the Donkey Creek Pump Station (near Rozet), and the well drilling project.





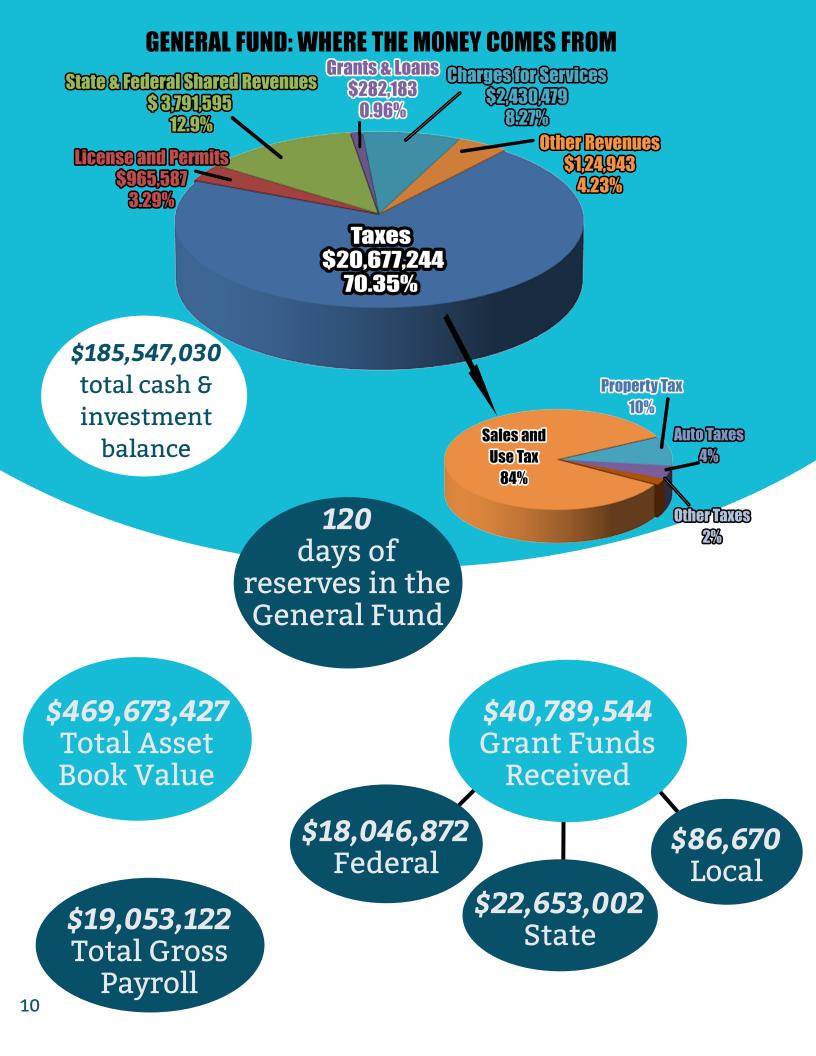




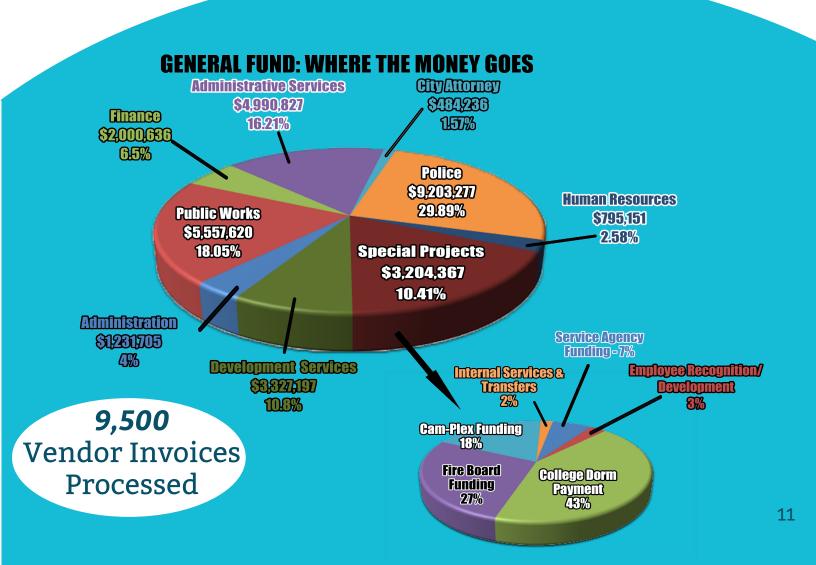


In 2017 the remaining work will be complete on all of the 42" transmission line projects, completing 45 miles of new pipeline. Additionally, the construction of the new Donkey Creek Pump Station and the drilling of wells M13, M14, and M15 will be complete. The new Madison wellfield piping and equipment, and the blending line projects, will begin construction. Three new water districts will be connected to the regional system, and the design will commence on the third district connection phase.









# **UTILITIES**

The Water Division has added 7 Regional Control Buildings and 4 additional Pressure Pump Stations as part of the Madison Pipeline Operations.

SCADA has desgined, programmed, built and installed control panels for 13 new Regional Water Facilities.

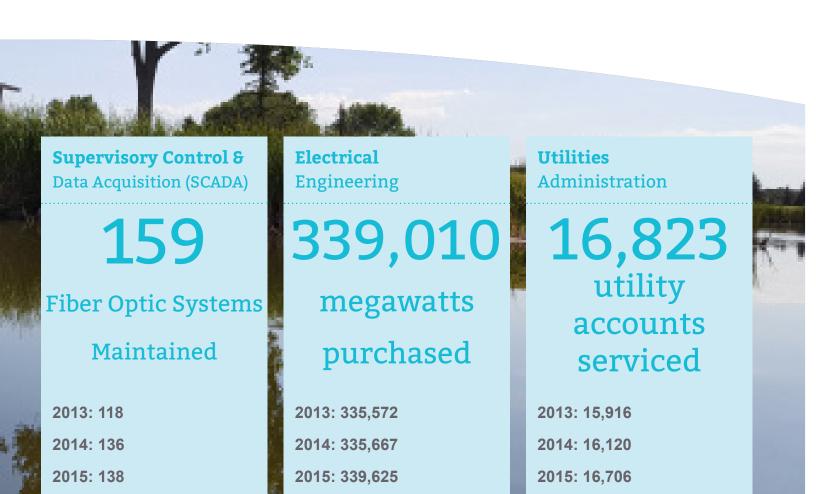

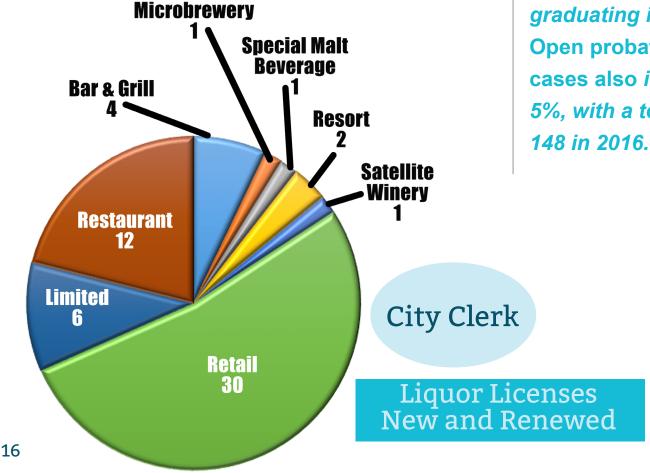

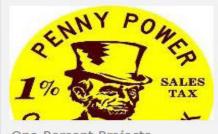


Scan code for interactive map gallery

## Gillette Police Department

#### Statistical Highlights

- Narcotics Related Cases (-3%) and Controlled Substance Arrests (-6.9%) are down. However seizures of marijuana (1,476%), methamphetamine (56.9%), cocaine (31.3%) and heroin (455%) are up.
- Traffic stops decreased from 8,686 in 2015, to 7,977 in 2016; an 8.2% change.
- Vehicle crashes decreased 16.4% and injuries from vehicle crashes decreased 25%. There were no fatalities from vehicle crashes in 2016.
- The Police Department responded to 31,884 calls in 2016, a 13.8% decrease from 2015.
- Criminal arrests of adults (18.2%) and juveniles (20.4%) both decreased from 2015 levels.

Dispatchers on duty August 3rd, 2016 and 'D' Shift were recognized by their peers for for their outstanding commitment to the City of Gillette and the citizens they serve.

Dispatch received a call about a husband and wife that were "down on their luck and had not eaten in three days." Without prompting, multiple members of 'D' Shift and Dispatch either retrieved food from their own reserves or donated money to purchase food. Three large bags of food were donated and delivered to this couple to help them out. These employees did not do this for recognition. They contributed because they knew it was the right thing to do.

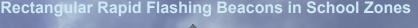

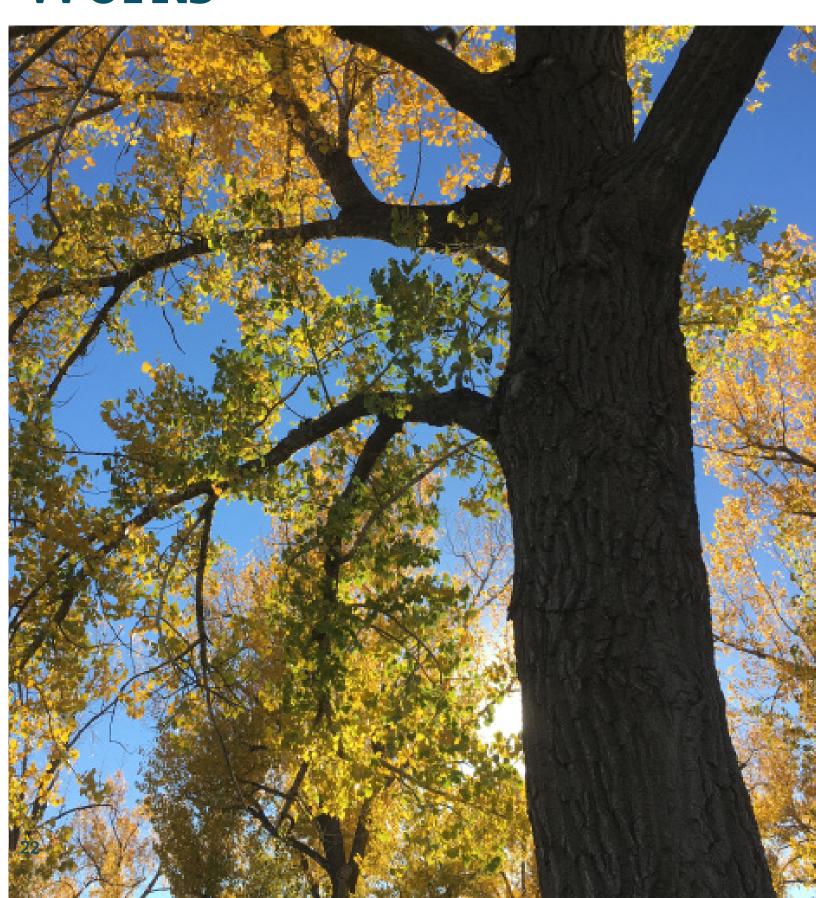
