Dear community members,

It is my pleasure to present the 2022 City of Gillette Annual Report. As I complete my first full year serving as the City Administrator, I am grateful for the opportunity to work with the Mayor and City Council serving our wonderful community.

This past year was a busy one for us, as we completed several key infrastructure projects, including the Foothills Boulevard Pavement Management Project and the Monte Vista Lane Utility Improvement Projects. We also continued critical improvements at our regional wastewater treatment facility and expanded our recreational offerings at the Energy Capital Sports Complex.

As always, public safety remains a top priority for the City. In 2022, our Police Department took the first steps in attaining national accreditation with the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). Both our citizens and officers will benefit from this process, which will include a comprehensive review of our current law enforcement policies and opportunities to learn from national best practices in policing.

In November, the voters of Campbell County renewed the Optional One Percent Sales Tax. Over the last 10 years, nearly 75% of One Percent funds received by the City of Gillette have been used for repairs and improvement to our streets & sidewalks, water, sewer and drainage infrastructure. We look forward to the continued responsible use of this important revenue source to improve quality of life for our residents!

The City was awarded \$3 million in federal Community Project Funding as part of the FY23 Omnibus Appropriations package for the replacement of the aging Gurley Overpass. In 2022, City Council resolved to memorialize the late Senator (and former beloved Mayor of the City of Gillette) by dedicating the new overpass in his name. As we move forward with the project in the coming year, we eagerly anticipate the future Mike Enzi Memorial Overpass.

Finally, I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation for our City staff. Their dedication, hard work, and tireless efforts are the driving force behind the progress we have made this year. Thank you to each and every one of them for their unwavering commitment to Gillette. We remain committed to serving this amazing community and making it an even better place to call home.

- Law enforcement will not accept gift cards as payment.
- You should never have to pay to receive a prize.

What to do if you are a victim:

- 1. Contact Law enforcement as soon as possible Some transactions can be reversed if caught in time.
- 2. Keep all documents Receipts, labels, gift cards, texts, emails, phone records.
- 3. Change all passwords, including those for bank websites, email, etc.



Accreditation helps police departments operate more professionally, justify their operations, and promote trust in their community. When an agency enrolls in an accreditation process they are committing to excellence in leadership, resource management, and delivery of services.

Did you know the City of Gillette has a Code Compliance Division which handles issues such as tall grass and weeds on private property? The Code Compliance Division operates year round and addresses unlicensed/inoperable, wrecked or junked motor vehicles and motor vehicle parts; appliances; tires and buckets; and garbage and debris. Additionally, the Code Compliance Division is responsible for issuing Daycare Zoning Approval, Home Occupation Permits, and Temporary Sign Permits. 

STREETS

The Streets Division maintains over 464 lane miles of City streets. Street maintenance includes patching potholes, sweeping and overseeing small patches in roadways and sidewalks. The Division mows and sprays for weeds on approximately 702 acres of right of way including shoulders, detention basins, dead end streets, fence lines, and other pieces of city owned property. They also maintain 49 dewatering wells.

The Animal Shelter still offers inhome adoption for people looking to rehome their pets. This allows owners to keep their pets in the home while we assist them in finding a suitable home. Animals don't have to come to the shelter and owners can speak personally with potential adopters.

The Animal Shelter continues making appointments for people to surrender animals. This allows staff to prepare for each animal coming into the shelter and make sure that we have room. By doing this we no longer run the risk of having to euthanize animals due to running out of room.

The shelter no longer euthanizes for TREATABLE ILLNESSES and MANAGEABLE BEHAVIOR PROBLEMS. We also encourage owners to claim their animals and offer help and assistance to our community.
