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



The City of Gillette is comprised of three wards each represented by two Council Members. The Mayor serves at-large.







The City of Gillette prides itself on providing high-quality infrastructure, thoughtful community recreation and cultural amenities, and a positive business environment that fosters economic diversity, growth, and success. We are a safe community and our elected officials and staff work closely to provide costeffective solutions driven by exceptional customer service.

Critical customer services provided by the City include:

- Street maintenance, parks, drainage and solid waste collection services through our Public Works Department.
- Water, sewer, power and commercial broadband services through our Utilities Department.
- Routine patrol, accident and crime investigation, animal control/shelter, traffic enforcement and related services through our Police Department.

 Building inspection/permitting, capital projects, engineering review, code compliance, zoning and subdivision review services that facilitate private development through our Development Services Department.

Our Public Affairs, Finance and Human Resources Departments provide internal support and additional customer services such as municipal court, public access television, city clerk services (like liquor licenses, parade permits, vendor license, etc.) and utility customer billing.

Through separate joint powers agreements, we partner with Campbell County and local service agencies to support essential social services, provide community-wide fire protection services, and professional management of the CAM-PLEX, our regional multi-purpose event center.

Enclosed for your information is a copy of the City's 2023 Annual Report. The report summarizes key metrics and major accomplishments completed in calendar year 2023. During the past year, we continued to focus our efforts on maintaining existing streets and infrastructure to the highest level possible through existing tax revenues, fees and charges. Some of our very large projects include replacement of the City Pool and major improvements at our Wastewater Treatment Plant. Our Police Department continues to move toward national accreditation through CALEA. Additional progress was made towards improving and expanding workforce housing. In 2023, the City completed a Housing Needs Assessment which provides goals for future implementation. Most importantly, the City started efforts to complete a Comprehensive Master Plan that will guide future development,

community investment and local land uses within Gillette over the next several decades. This Comprehensive Plan is expected to be complete in 2025.






FINANCE

In November the Finance division was presented an Award of Financial Reporting Acheivement from the Government Finance Officers Association.



Of the \$4.562M in grant funding the City received in Fiscal Year 2023, 85% (or \$3.88M) was utilized to directly fund infrastructure improvements for the City's Wastewater Treatment plant and Water fund, therefore helping to reduce the rate increases needed for Sewer and Water. The remaining \$682K allowed the City to leverage taxpayer dollars to improve recreational facilities and provide higher levels of services.

ANIMAL SHELTER

The Animal Control Division provides enforcement of the City's ordinances on animal control. They work to balance health, safety, and welfare needs of people and animals. The Animal Shelter is a City owned and operated facility. It provides housing and other shelter services for Gillette and Campbell County.

Staff performed many public outreach programs in 2023, including presentations to local schools and group events. In addition, the Foster-to-Adopt program was introduced, which allows animals to be fostered by potential adopters before they are spayed/neutered.

SRT Rescue Truck

The Search & Rescue Truck, provided by the Campbell County Fire Department, is used in conjunction with the Bearcat. This specialized vehicle is used to transport tactical and crisis negotiator equipment, ensuring essential resources are readily available for rapid deployment.





The Lenco Bearcat is an armored rescue vehicle designed specifically for law enforcement purposes. Utilized primarily by specialized units such as the Gillette Police Department's Special Response Team, the Bearcat serves a crucial role in providing safety to officers during critical incidents and facilitating the rescue of citizens and fellow law enforcement personnel. With its armor, the Bearcat offers enhanced protection and mobility in high-risk situations, ensuring the effectiveness and safety of law enforcement operations.

New Traffic Team Created

The Gillette Police Department Traffic Enforcement Team is dedicated to ensuring the safety of our community by enforcing traffic laws, particularly focusing on common violations that often lead to accidents. The mission is to decrease the overall number of crashes, with a special emphasis on reducing those resulting in injuries. Through proactive enforcement and education initiatives, they strive to create safer roadways for all residents and visitors.



K9 Biko Retires

K9 Biko was born in Europe and transported to the United States for police work in 2017. In 2019, Biko was obtained by the Gillette Police Department at no cost from an out of state agency experiencing training issues. The agency was looking to rehome Biko to another police department.

K9 Biko was introduced to Officer Trevor Johnson who had retired his first police dog, K9 Lord, in early 2020. Officer Johnson spent countless hours cultivating trust and a bond with Biko. The two eventually completed a two-month training course in Gillette and went on to be a certified K9 team through the Wyoming Police Service Dog Association.

Biko has been the faithful partner for now Corporal Johnson for the past three and half years. During his time in service for Corporal Johnson, Biko has been a part of over 200 arrests and over 1,500 calls for service. He has searched for narcotics, property, and people for not only the Gillette Police Department, but multiple agencies in Northern Wyoming.

With Biko's age approaching retirement and Corporal Johnson being promoted, Biko was retired from working the street while in good health, allowing him the opportunity to live out a healthy happy retirement in the Johnson household.






GILLETTE PUBLIC ACCESS TELEVISION

STREETS

The Streets division maintains more than 464 lane miles of City streets. Street maintenance includes patching potholes, sweeping and overseeing small patches in roadways and sidewalks. The division mows and sprays for weeds on approximately 702 acres of right of way, including shoulders, detention basins, dead-end streets, fence lines, and other pieces of City-owned property. In 2023, Streets staff was responsible for plowing for 13 separate snow events. They also provided street closure services for 17 special events.


